Of Shepherd's Sharing:

The Tree

Jeremiah 17:7-8 says, "Blessed is the man who trusts in the LORD, whose trust is the LORD. He is like a tree planted by water, that sends out its roots by the stream, and does not fear when heat comes, for its leaves remain green, and is not anxious in the year of drought, for it does not cease to bear fruit."

Just a few weeks ago, I shared a larger part of this passage at church, as it was part of the lectionary readings for that Sunday. While I was preparing to share the benediction and close the service, I felt led to share with the congregation an image the Holy Spirit downloaded upon me while I was standing there.

I saw a tree by a stream, like the verse describes. But then I saw the image in an added dimension, as the Lord spoke to my spirit and said, "As people of faith, we are to be planted by the stream. We are to be active in our spiritual disciplines like praying, reading the Bible (studying Gods Word), worshiping the Lord with our time in music and fellowship with likeminded believers. These disciplines allow our roots to grow deep, so when storms hit, and they will hit, our roots hold us fast. They hold because they have been fed by Him.

Then I saw people coming to the trees, seeking shelter. Some from the storms of life. Trying to find a place to be shielded from the downpour of oppression and depression that they are being deluged with. Others come to sit under their branches on a hot day, resting, wanting a break from the heat and the monotonous grind of daily living. The people I saw in my vision saw the trees as a place of refuge. They were seeking the Lord, and for some of them, they didn't even know that. They were just wanting to hit a pause button on their life so they could rest.

Our trust in the Lord, and the disciplines we apply to our Christian walk will give us the ability to help others when they come seeking a place of refuge. Just be who God has made you to be.

The important thing is we have a good root system. Our tree needs to be strong and healthy. We can't become lazy or satisfied with where we stand in our faith walk. We need to constantly be asking God, how can I trust you more? What can I do to grow in You more?

After sharing this with the congregation, I had a gentleman come forward and share a story with me. He said a good friend of his was just diagnosed with cancer and the diagnosis wasn't good. His friend opened up and shared his heart with him. It was after hearing my words that this man realized, his friend had come to him to sit and rest. To take refuge in the presence of God in the midst of chaos of his life. It was the God in this man who his friend was seeking. And so, it is with all of us. We can all be used like this, so long as we allow our roots to be healthy.

So please take care of yourself spiritually speaking. Do what you need to do to make sure your roots are nourished. You never know when someone will come and sit under your tree, wanting nothing but a little peace or maybe hint of hope...that there is more to life than their current situation. In those moments...TRUST in the LORD!



Ad Council

Eight members were present when the meeting was called to order with prayer at 6 p.m. on February 10th. The December 9th minutes were amended to change a name. The minutes were approved as corrected.

We discussed guidelines for the Grace Fund.

For SPRT, it was reported the Indiana United Methodist Church is going from 10 districts to 5 districts. We will become the West Central Plains District in July. SPRT is asking members to write a letter to a graduating Senior at North Montgomery. The Pastor will be out of the pulpit March 9th through March 16th. Lan Wilson will speak on March 9th and on March 16thwe will have Information Sunday. The Music Director will be gone March 23 on a Mission Trip over Spring Break.

The Pastor is taking a Spiritual Formation and Discipleship class. It is Christian Disciplines with a John Wesley slant. Ash Wednesday and Easter services are as follows:

- Ash Wednesday combined service at Colfax UMC on March 5th at 7 p.m. (Pastor Dave speaking)
- Maundy Thursday service at Darlington UMC combined with Colfax UMC on April 17th at 7 p.m. (Pastor Dave speaking)
- Good Friday service at Darlington UMC on April 18th at 7 p.m. (Pastor Dave and Pastor Esther speaking)
- Sunrise service with Breakfast following at Darlington UMC with East Christian Church members as our guests on April 20th at 7 a.m. (Pastor Ron Brown – East Christian Church speaking)
- Easter Worship service at Darington UMC on April 20th at 9 a.m. (Pastor Dave speaking)

The Financial Report was given starting with December and Year End information. The Lord was good to us financially and we ended in the black for the year 2024, even with all the improvements that were made to the church building and the parsonage. January has proved to be a good month also. We paid for Pastor's spring educational class and Colfax will pay for his fall class. Comcast was contacted and they came and fixed the line. They moved the phone from the Secretary's Office to Pastor's office and put a wireless upstairs in the kitchen. We are streaming live during the worship service now. A new message will be put on the answering machine that will include Pastor's cell number for those who need to get in touch before he is in the office. The budgeted gas bill was questioned. Once we changed from oil to gas there was a big credit left over from last year's budgeting.

Worship Chair reported she had contacted two Background Checking Companies. MinistrySafe and SafeHiring Solutions (MinistryDefender Solutions) were contacted. The first one was a site that the Indiana UMC Conferences use. There is a charge to join right now, but in July when the Conference goes to 5 districts it would be free. Their checks were lower but there were extra charges for other things. The second site was with an Indiana-based company from Indianapolis. They serve 3500+ churches throughout the country. They charge no fee to join and their checks are reasonable. A motion to go with MinistryDefender Solutions using Level 1 for the Background Checks and review every three years was made and seconded. The motion passed.

Trustee Chair hasn't had a meeting yet, but they need to meet to annually review the church's insurance to make sure we have adequate insurance.

Mission Chair was to meet with the prior Missions Chair, but plans were changed.

With no other business to discuss, amazingly we finished only 10 minutes after 7. Pastor was asked to close the meeting with prayer.

Our next meeting will be on April 14th, at 6 p.m.


out at that rate which this number fluctuates all the time.

- Medical Clinic: Over 3600
 patients have been treated with
 loving, respectful and quality medical
 care, with over 5300 lab tests being
 run in our on-site laboratory!
- <u>Nutrition Programs:</u> 132 children aged 6 months to 6 years received nutritional support and specialized treatment from our clinic doctor! Parents have also been provided health and nutrition workshops throughout the year.
- <u>Education Support:</u> 81 students of the 91 that began 2024 in our middle and high school scholarship program will successfully complete the year of study and 13 will graduate high school! In our "Kematz'ib" computer academy, 117 students have been enrolled in computer classes and 33 will graduate this year!
